Special emphasis is placed on developing teacher training programs, establishing robust industry-academia linkages, and creating a comprehensive framework for career counselling and skill development.

Major Issues in Pakistan's Education System

1. Inadequate Funding

Education in Pakistan remains chronically underfunded, with the sector consistently receiving less than the recommended 4% of GDP. This reflects a lack of prioritization at the national level, leading to dilapidated infrastructure, overcrowded classrooms, and insufficient teaching resources. Schools often lack basic amenities such as clean water, electricity, and functional toilets, further discouraging student retention, particularly for girls. This underinvestment has also hindered the adoption of innovative teaching methods and technologies, leaving students ill-equipped to meet the demands of a modern, competitive world.

2. Outdated Curriculum

The curriculum in Pakistan has failed to keep pace with global advancements and the evolving needs of the job market. It remains heavily focused on rote memorization rather than fostering critical thinking, creativity, and problem-solving skills. Furthermore, it neglects emerging fields

such as technology, entrepreneurship, and artificial intelligence, which are crucial for future employment opportunities. Consequently, while thousands of students graduate annually, many lack the technical expertise and soft skills required to thrive in an increasingly knowledge-based economy.

3. Insufficient Teacher Training

Teachers play a pivotal role in shaping students' futures, yet the professional development of educators in Pakistan is severely lacking. Many teachers are underqualified or receive minimal training, resulting in outdated and ineffective teaching practices. Pedagogical approaches often fail to engage students or equip them with practical knowledge. Moreover, a lack of incentives and career growth opportunities discourages talented individuals from entering the teaching profession, further exacerbating the issue.

4. Lack of Quality Education

The disparity in education quality between urban and rural areas is one of the most pressing issues in Pakistan. While private schools in urban centers may offer competitive education, government schools, especially in rural regions, are often under-resourced and poorly managed. Students in rural areas frequently face challenges such as a lack of qualified teachers, inadequate learning materials, and long commutes to school. This stark urban-rural divide perpetuates inequality and leaves a significant portion of the population at a disadvantage, ultimately impacting national development.

5. Poor Accountability and Monitoring

The absence of robust accountability mechanisms has led to systemic inefficiencies in Pakistan's education sector. In many public schools, teacher absenteeism and a lack of performance monitoring are rampant, undermining the quality of education. The absence of standardized benchmarks to evaluate schools and teachers further exacerbates this issue. Without a strong framework to ensure accountability, resources are often mismanaged, and students are deprived of the quality education they deserve.

Impact on Unemployment

The shortcomings of Pakistan's education system are starkly evident in the country's rising unemployment rates, particularly among graduates. The disconnect between education and employability creates a labor force that is academically qualified but lacks the practical skills, critical thinking abilities, and technological literacy required by today's dynamic job market. According to the Pakistan Institute of Development Economics (PIDE), both supply-side (skills mismatch) and demand-side (limited job creation) factors are fueling the unemployment crisis.

Recent statistics highlight the gravity of the situation. Between 2018-19 and 2020-21, the unemployment rate for graduates rose from 14.9% to 16.1%. Certain fields, such as engineering and computer science, have experienced disproportionately high increases in unemployment. For instance, the jobless rate for engineers doubled from 11% to a staggering 23.5% during the same period, showcasing the inability of the education system to align with labor market demands. These alarming figures underline the urgent need for systemic reforms to make education relevant and effective in preparing students for employment.

Recommendations

1. Increase the Education Budget

Allocating a larger portion of the national GDP to education is essential for addressing systemic

issues. Increased funding can support the construction of modern infrastructure, provision of teaching aids, competitive salaries for qualified educators, and the adoption of advanced technologies. This financial investment will serve as the foundation for building an education system that meets international standards.

2. Modernize the Curriculum

The curriculum must be overhauled to reflect the realities of the 21st-century job market. This includes incorporating modules on emerging technologies, practical problem-solving, communication skills, and financial literacy. Close collaboration with industry stakeholders can ensure that course content addresses current and future workforce needs, making graduates job-ready upon completion of their education.

3. Promote Technical and Vocational Education

A greater emphasis on technical and vocational education (TVET) can bridge the gap between academic learning and industry requirements. Establishing partnerships with industries to design and deliver skills-based training programs can create pathways for students to enter specialized fields such as manufacturing, IT, healthcare, and renewable energy. TVET programs should also be accessible in rural areas to provide equitable opportunities for all.

4. Improve Teacher Training and Professional Development

Regular teacher training and professional development programs are crucial for enhancing the quality of education. Teachers should be equipped with modern pedagogical techniques, digital skills, and an understanding of industry trends. Certification programs and continuous learning opportunities will ensure that educators remain competent and motivated, directly improving student outcomes.

5. Establish a Career Counselling System

Implementing career counselling services in schools and universities can guide students in choosing fields of study aligned with their interests and market demand. Career advisors can help identify skill gaps, recommend relevant courses, and connect students with internship or apprenticeship opportunities, ensuring a smoother transition from education to employment.
